Sources of Funding

A stand-alone trade mission trust account was created at the Massachusetts Marketing Partnership (MMP), which is the state agency charged with executing trade mission activities. The Executive Office of Housing and Economic Development (HED) deposits all sources of funding to support domestic and international trade mission activities into this account for efficiency and transparency. All expenses for trade mission activities are charged back to this account and all sources of funding for trade mission activities are deposited into this account. To date, there are two sources of funds to support trade mission activities:

- 1. Five state quasi-public agencies have each contributed \$50,000 to support trade mission activities for a total of \$250,000. These same funds were used both for this trip and for the Governor's trade mission to the United Kingdom and Israel in May of 2011. The agencies are:
 - o Massachusetts Development Finance Agency;
 - o Massachusetts Convention Center Authority;
 - o Massachusetts Technology Collaborative;
 - o Massachusetts Life Sciences Center; and
 - Massachusetts Clean Energy Center.
- 2. Moving Massachusetts Forward, Inc. (MMF), the non-profit established to raise funds to support trade missions, has also contributed \$125,000 to current trade mission activities.

The travel expenses for the trade mission for Governor Patrick and the other members of the delegation from Massachusetts (i.e., the appointed state employees) were discounted by private donors who contributed to the MMF. The individual private donors to MMF are listed below. No individual member of the state delegation received direct or individual discounted travel from an individual sponsor. All funds have been aggregated so that no individual donor contributed directly to any individual member's travel expenses.
