PARCC (Partnership for Assessment of Readiness for College and Careers) is a multi-state consortium working together to develop next-generation K-12 student assessments in English and math.

In June 2010, Massachusetts signed a Memorandum of Understanding with other member states to join the PARCC consortium. The MOU was signed by Governor Patrick, Commissioner Chester and Maura Banta, Chair of the Board of Elementary and Secondary Education. The MOU provides that the states that are signatories to the MOU are members of a consortium that have organized themselves to apply for and carry out the objectives of a grant program (known as the Comprehensive Assessment Systems grant) that was available through the U.S. Department of Education.

PARCC successfully competed for and, in September 2010, was awarded a \$186 million Comprehensive Assessment Systems grant through the U.S. Department of Education's Race to the Top assessment competition. The grant is designed to support the development of new assessment systems that measure student knowledge and skill against a common set of college and career ready standards in mathematics and English language arts.

In his capacity as the chief state school officer in Massachusetts, Commissioner Chester currently serves without compensation as Chair of the Governing Board of PARCC. PARCC Releases Initial Set of Item and Task Prototypes and Updated Interactive Model Content Frameworks

First glimpse into the connection between the Common Core State Standards and new, innovative assessments being developed by the 23-state consortium

MALDEN - The Partnership for Assessment of Readiness for College and Careers (PARCC) today released its first set of item and task prototypes.

"The prototypes are a first step in demonstrating what is possible with new assessment technology that captures students' application of knowledge and skills that are essential to success in the 21st century," said Massachusetts Elementary and Secondary Education Commissioner Mitchell Chester, chair of the PARCC Governing Board. "The prototypes are illustrative of the next-generation PARCC assessment system that reflects the Common Core State Standards." The 2011 Massachusetts curriculum frameworks in English language arts and mathematics are based on the Common Core State Standards (CCSS).

PARCC is a 23-state consortium, of which Massachusetts is a member, working together to create new assessments in English language arts/literacy and mathematics planned for administration beginning in 2014–2015.

The primary purpose of sharing item and task prototypes is to provide information to educators and to support them as they transition to the CCSS and the PARCC assessments. The dynamic, online prototypes presented on the PARCC website demonstrate that core shifts at the heart of the CCSS are also integrated into the design of PARCC's technology-based assessments.

Educators will find more than just sample test questions. Every item and task prototype is annotated with the standard being measured, the type of assessment on which it would appear, and a link to the revised PARCC Model Content Frameworks, which serve as a bridge between the CCSS and the PARCC assessments.

In addition to the released item and task prototypes, the website provides other ancillary materials developed to build understanding of how the prototypes illuminate the richness of the CCSS. These materials include:

- PowerPoint presentations to explain the advances planned for the PARCC assessments in English language arts/literacy and mathematics
- Item-specific information, including a description of how items are aligned to the standards and how items will be scored

This initial release of 26 prototypes is just the beginning. Over the next two years, additional prototypes and rubrics will be released to represent the full range of assessment tasks that will be included on actual PARCC assessments beginning in 2014–2015. These new additions will help to paint a more complete picture of the PARCC assessment design in each content area and at each grade level.

The <u>PARCC Leadership Team</u> directed the development and review of this collaborative effort through its managing partner, Achieve, and through contracts with Student Achievement Partners, the University of Pittsburgh's Institute for Learning, the University of Texas at Austin's Dana Center, Illustrative Mathematics and Bill McCallum of the University of Arizona, ETS, and Pearson.

Funding for the development of the prototype website was made possible by a grant to Achieve from the William and Flora Hewlett Foundation.

In addition to the release of the prototypes, PARCC is releasing updated versions of the Model Content Frameworks for ELA/literacy and mathematics. PARCC held a public comment period in June 2012 asking educators and other stakeholders to provide suggestions on areas in the frameworks that needed additional specificity or clarity. The Model Content Frameworks for mathematics now include a revised high section that provides assessment guidance for Algebra I, Geometry, and Algebra II, and for Mathematics I, Mathematics III, and

In order to make the frameworks more accessible and user friendly, with the support of the GE Foundation, PARCC developed a searchable online version of the Model Content Frameworks. The site includes a search browser, an online glossary, and direct references back to the standards.

We are submitting this letter to accompany the attached Memorandum of Understanding in order to clarify Massachusetts' position in two important areas. First, we want to emphasize that Massachusetts will not adopt any set of standards that are not at least as comprehensive and rigorous as, if not more than, our current standards. We have been participating in the Common Core Standards development effort and have set out a timeline for considering them, but we cannot commit to adoption until we are satisfied that they maintain or exceed the high standards that have been developed in Massachusetts over the past 17 years.

Second, it is our intention to use the assessment system that is developed by the PARCC to the extent it serves the best interests of students and teachers. Similar to our above-stated position with respect to standards, we cannot commit to adopting any new system of assessments until it is developed and we can ensure it is as comprehensive and rigorous as, if not more than, our current system. We are excited about the opportunity for Massachusetts to play a key role in the development of the assessment system, both as a governing state in the consortium and through the work of Commissioner Chester, who will serve as chair of the consortium for its first year. Once the new system is developed and we are able to make the determination that the new assessment system is at least as comprehensive and rigorous as our current system in Massachusetts, we will then work to implement it.

With that said, we are committed to working in partnership with the Consortium, leveraging the expertise and experience of other states in this area, and to sharing our own expertise and experience. We are eager to participate in all aspects of this vital work and strongly believe the Consortium's efforts offer tremendous promise for students and
