2:45	Vaccine Exemption Laws: The Debates Continue
	All 50 states have legislation requiring specific vaccines for students. Although exemptions vary from state to state, all school immunization laws grant exemptions to children for medical reasons, and almost all states grant religious exemptions for people who have religious beliefs against immunizations. Eighteen states allow philosophical exemptions for those who object to immunizations because of personal, moral or other beliefs.
	In 2015, 12 states considered legislation addressing immunization exemptions. Two of those states - Vermont and California – will no longer allow philosophical exemptions beginning in July 2016. West Virginia and Mississippi have similarly strict laws. Debates in various state capitols will likely continue in 2016. What has fueled the debates in California and Vermont? Why and how have both states changed their laws?
