

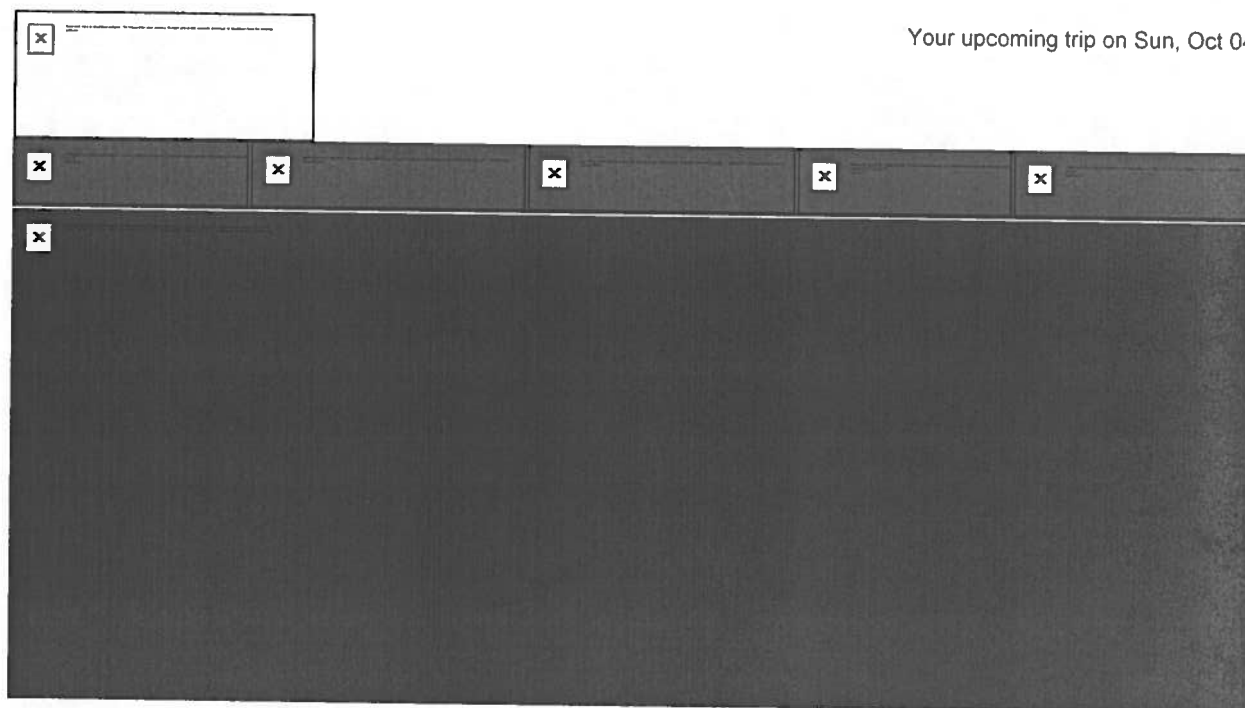

CHECK-IN TIMES
